In 2025, providers, families, and advocates from across Oregon call on the Legislature to choose children in early learning and care, health, and family support.

The Oregon Legislature faces a critical moment in 2025 to prioritize Oregon's young children, prenatal through age 5, and address systemic barriers to their well-being.

Proactive investments in early childhood services can break cycles of poverty, decrease maternal and infant mortality, and ensure long-term stability for children and families across Oregon.

When we choose children, we improve people's lives and bend the cost curve on spending driven by crises. Prioritizing children builds a more just and promising future for all.
