In 2025, providers, families, and advocates from across Oregon call on the Legislature to choose children in early learning and care, health, and family support.

The Oregon Legislature faces a critical moment in 2025 to prioritize Oregon's young children, prenatal through age 5, and address systemic barriers to their wellbeing.

Proactive investments in early childhood services can break cycles of poverty, decrease maternal and infant mortality, and ensure long-term stability for children and families across Oregon.

When we choose children, we improve people's lives and bend the cost curve on spending driven by crises. Prioritizing children builds a more just and promising future for all.

Racial Equity Priorities

Oregon's Early Childhood Coalition has identified five racial equity priorities for the 2025 legislative session. These priorities are identified as most important to heal harms to Black and Indigenous children, and children of color. By addressing racial disparities, we simultaneously work to remove barriers for all marginalized communities.
