

Early Childhood Programs in Oregon



Did You Know? There are 242,700 children between the ages of 0-5 living in Oregon.

Oregon is laying the foundation for a strong early learning and care system. One that helps every child thrive from the very start. To make this happen, the state offers a range of programs that meet families where they are and advance key goals, including:

- Children are raised in healthy, stable, and attached families
- Children are ready for Kindergarten
- Oregon's early learning system is aligned, coordinated, and family centered

Oregon's early learning and care system is designed to be flexible, inclusive, and responsive to families' needs.



What to know about Oregon's early learning and care system:

- It's not one-size-fits-all. Oregon uses a mixed-delivery model, offering different types of programs to support children and families in ways that work best for them.
- Quality is a priority. Programs strive to be developmentally appropriate, culturally responsive, and inclusive of children with disabilities.
- **Participation is voluntary.** Families choose whether to take part in the programs.
- **Programs complement each other.** Families may benefit from more than one program. Ideally, programs coordinate to best serve children and families.
- Some programs are universal, others are targeted.
 While some are open to all families, others have eligibility requirements based on federal or state law.
- **Demand exceeds availability.** Many programs can't serve every interested family due to limited funding, staffing, and space—so participation is often prioritized.



Early Childhood Programs in Oregon

The next few pages highlight Oregon's early care and education programs, aligned and coordinated systems, and family services.

Early Care and Education Programs	
Designed for ages 0-3	Designed for ages 3-5
Early Head Start (DELC) Intensive comprehensive child development and family support services to infants and toddlers and their families. Can be offered through home visits, classrooms, or combination.	Head Start (DELC) Helps young children prepare to succeed in school and promotes children's development through services that support early learning, health, and family wellbeing.
Funding: Federal funding to local programs Eligibility: Mostly <100% federal poverty level	Funding: Federal funding to local programs Eligibility: Mostly <100% federal poverty level

Oregon Prenatal to Kindergarten - OPK (DELC)

This is Oregon's state investment in Early Head Start & Head Start.

Funding: State (General Fund)

Eligibility: Mostly <100% federal poverty level

Early Intervention & Early Childhood Special Education - EI/ECSE (ODE)

Provides a seamless system to support the development and educational needs of children with diagnosed disability and delay, ages 0-5, and their families.

Funding: Federal, Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) funding parts B & C and state funding (General Fund)

Eligibility: Diagnosed disability or significant developmental delay

Employment Related Day Care - ERDC (DELC)

Helps families that are working, in school, or addressing other family well-being needs to afford child care.

Funding: Federal Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) & state funding **Eligibility:** 200% federal poverty level

Baby Promise (DELC)

Provides infant and toddler child care to low-income families through contracts with child care providers

Funding: CCDBG (Child Care & Development Block Grant)

Eligibility: 200% federal poverty level

Preschool Promise (DELC)

Provides free, quality preschool to lowincome families through grants to preschool providers.

Funding: State

Eligibility: 200% federal poverty level

	Kindergarten Partnership & Innovation Fund (DELC) Connects early learning with K-12 through parent engagement and summer transition to kindergarten. Funding: State Eligibility: Open to all families	
Aligned and Coordinated Systems

Early Learning Hubs

16 locally organized Hubs coordinate early learning and care and promote cross-sector partnerships to create local systems that are aligned, coordinated, and family-centered.

Funding: State

Child Care Resources

Recruit, train and promote retention of a high quality, diverse Early Learning and Child Care Workforce through professional development and collaboration.

Funding: State & federal CCDBG

Department of Early Learning & Care (DELC): DELC is responsible for providing high quality early learning and care services to children and families in Oregon. DELC works closely with other state agencies, local governments, schools, child care providers, parents, and other stakeholders to ensure that the best possible early learning experiences are available for all children in Oregon.



Family Support Programs	
Designed for ages 0-3	Designed for ages 3-5
Universally offered nurse home visits (OHA) Families can choose to receive up to 3 visits from a nurse in their home to check in, connect with desired support.	
Funding: Medicaid & state match, insurance, OHA Eligibility: Open to all families	
Intensive home visiting (DELC, ODHS, OHA) Families meet ~weekly with skilled home visitor to set family & child goals and work toward them. Oregon has multiple programs: Healthy Families Oregon, Nurse Family Partnership, Early Head Start (home visiting model), Family Spirit, and Parents as Teachers.	
Funding: Federal (MIECHV & Medicaid), DELC, OHA, ODHS Eligibility: Based on risk factors	

Relief Nurseries (DELC)

Relief Nurseries provide children, birth through age five, and their families with wraparound support to strengthen infant and early childhood mental health, prevent child abuse, and avoid unnecessary foster care. The unique Relief Nursery model combines parent education, home visits, and therapeutic classrooms at nearly 40 sites across oregon.

Funding: State & local match (Relief Nurseries provide a minumum 25% match for state funding), philanthropy

Eligibility: Based on risk factors

Parenting Education (DELC, ODHS, OHA)

Provides families with free parenting classes, resources, and events to support reliable, responsive, and sensitive parenting.

Funding: Funded through philanthropy and state funding

Eligibility: Open to all families



Oregon's Child Care Landscape

In 2025, Oregon State University released a report mapping Oregon's child care supply by age group and percentage of publicly funded slots.

Public funding plays a major role in building Oregon's child care supply.

Without it, **all 36 counties** would be child care deserts for infants and toddlers (ages 0-2) and **28 counties** would be (ages 3-5) child care deserts for preschool aged children (ages 3-5)!
